PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

We maintain a core group of dedicated, interdisciplinary faculty, with backgrounds in business, geography, philosophy, political science, and survey research.

Over 80 percent of our students in the current cohort are expected to graduate this summer, and our overall persistent rate toward graduation for all cohorts since 2017 stands at 80 percent.

BACKGROUND

The MPP program at UNI is a fully online program established in 2015 (it was an on-campus program from 1991-2015). The program was accredited by NASPAA in 2023, making it the only program in Iowa to receive that designation. As stated in its mission statement, the purpose of the program "is to enhance the public service values of emerging and mid-career public service professionals and equip them with the knowledge and skills needed to analyze, develop, and evaluate public policy and affairs at all levels of government." Students move through the two-year program as part of a cohort, developing professional relationships with a network of colleagues. Recognizing that many of our students are working professionals, the curriculum is designed to ensure flexibility. Students take two courses per

semester, but the courses are offered sequentially, meaning students take one course the first 8 weeks and the second course the second 8 weeks of each semester. Courses meet via Zoom on Tuesday nights and focus on providing practical skills for students interested in working in the public and nonprofit sectors. Additionally, students are required to complete two practitioner-based courses, an internship and a capstone practicum, where students work in conjunction with policy practitioners to apply skills learned throughout the program to real-world policy issues. Upon graduation, students will have developed skills in policy analysis, program evaluation, and data analytics, among others, along with a portfolio of applied research based on interactions with practitioners in the field.

MPP UPDATES

MOVING to

We are excited to announce that the Master of Public Policy (MPP) program at the University of Northern Iowa has moved to annual cohorts.

We will be admitting students every fall semester, with the application portal opening in November or December for admittance to the following fall semester. The move to annual cohorts allows us to better serve our prospective students, specifically those early to mid-career professionals across lowa who may be looking for a flexible and practical online program.

Students will continue to have two opportunities to engage with practitioners as part of our core curriculum, and we remain the only program in lowa to be accredited by NASPAA.

PARTNERSHIPS with IOWA CITIES ANNUAL COHORTS THROUGH CAPSTONE PROJECTS

As part of the curriculum, students are required to complete two practitioner-based courses, including a "Capstone practicum" course in their final semester. The purpose of the capstone is to provide students with an opportunity to apply the data analytic and program evaluation skills learned throughout the program by partnering with selected organizations in surrounding communities to engage in policy analysis and decision making.

We are excited to announce our summer 2025 partnerships, adding to our relationships with cities and organizations throughout lowa.

WHAT BROUGHT YOU TO UNI?

Before entering the MPP program, I earned my degree in Public
Administration from UNI. I then spent
11 years working in the public sector,
gaining valuable experience. Pursuing
my master's had been on my mind for
several years, and I eventually realized
that if I didn't take the leap now, I might
never do it. UNI and the MPP program
was a natural fit due to my familiarity
with the College of Social & Behavioral
Sciences, faculty and UNI being in
close proximity to home.

WHAT DID YOU ENJOY MOST?

I really enjoyed how the program encouraged real-world application of public policy theories. The small class sizes allowed engaging discussions, and I appreciated how accessible and supportive the faculty were throughout the program. I also valued the flexibility of being able to take

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE UNII?

After working in local government as a city clerk, city administrator, and county director of policy and administration, I had a strong desire to further develop my knowledge of policy design and analysis at an in-depth, rigorous level that professional conferences and seminars cannot provide. UNI's MPP program offers a flexible schedule for non-traditional students and ongoing opportunities to engage meaningfully in cohort-based learning and to benefit from the experience of other professionals.

HOW DID YOU BECOME INTERESTED?

While I was searching for ways to continue my professional development, I received an email from UNI about the MPP program. I received my undergraduate degrees from UNI, so the MPP program was a perfect fit.

WHAT DO YOU DO IN YOUR CURRENT POSITION?

I work closely with the Linn County Board of Supervisors to plan and implement a wide variety of initiatives and priorities. I provide research and analysis to the Board and other decision makers on those topics and recommend other measures to the Board for consideration and adoption. I write and help implement internal policies and procedures and oversee a wide variety of contracts, leases, and agreements. I monitor state legislative activity for the County and act as a liaison with lobbyists and legislators. I develop and provide oversight for the capital improvement plan and manage a variety of special or one-time projects and serve as the County's Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordinator.

I enjoy working in local government, as opposed to state or federal government, because it is the government most accessible to the public and because of the positive, meaningful impact I have seen it have on people's every day lives.

HOW DID UNI MPP PREPARE YOU?

I started in my current role before
I enrolled in the MPP program, but
it introduced and enhanced skills
that I use regularly. For example, the
program started with course work in
using case studies to apply theory to
practice, which is directly applicable
to policy analysis and research that I
perform. A specific tool taught in the
program is the criteria selection matrix
that I continue to use an essential
evaluation method. I keep also Eugene
Bardach's A Practical Guide for Policy
Analysis on my desk and refer to its
Eightfold Path from time to time.

MOST MEMORABLE EXPERIENCE?

Specific theories that stick out and that I continue to refer to as part of my job are salience and proximity, bounded rationality, image and venue, and the paradox of search.

David Graeber's *The Utopia of Rules* is the book that most challenged me to think about my understanding of how things work and Robert Reich's Saving Capitalism is the book I enjoyed reading the most.
